1/2d	Printed matter, anywhere, per 2 oz, maximum: inland 5 lb, abroad 4 lb or if single volume 6½ lb Newspapers printed within the colony, inland, up to 4 oz (Commercial papers, abroad, per 2 oz, minimum rate: 3d, maximum: 4 lb) (Samples, abroad, per 2 oz, minimum rate: 1d, maximum: 1 lb)
1d	Postcard, inland & empire Commercial papers, samples, inland, per 4 oz, maximum: 5 lb Newspapers printed within the colony, inland, over 4 oz Samples, abroad, minimum rate (Letter, inland & empire, per subsequent oz)
1½d	Letter, inland & empire, 1 st oz Postcard, foreign (Letter, foreign, per subsequent oz)
3d	Letter, foreign, 1 st oz Commercial papers, abroad, minimum rate (Registration, Advice of delivery or Parcel certificate of posting fees) (Parcel, inland, per subsequent lb, maximum: 22 lb)

The 1½ d and 6d stamps provide sufficient for the registrataion of 3d and the first ounce empire rate. The balance of 3d would be enough for three subsequent ounces or for advice of delivery, but there is no indication of such.
